



Architectural Changes in Fauquier County Farmhouses

Before the Revolution and, in fact, for some time afterward the typical Fauquier farmhouse was a plain, utilitarian structure devoid of any architectural pretense. The man who changed that was apparently William H. Sutton. We do not know where he came from or what his background was. He called himself a carpenter and did not pretend to be a trained architect, but he was a superb craftsman. He probably worked from a "pattern book" derived from Vitruvius, and reproduced in wood the classic proportions of the Greek Revival period with the utmost attention to detail. Thirteen homes in Fauquier County have been identified as being in whole or in part by Sutton as he did not distain adding his elegant porticos and other details to already existing buildings. Such houses, built between 1820 and 1850, as "Glenville", "Woodside", "Waverly", "Dondoric", and "Hartlands" are existing testimonies to his remarkable genius.
